Sir, I have the honour to report as Jollows: -The party was duly conducted to The Born Ground, The position of which will be fixed later, as The site is possibly in another Parish other Than That of the map provides. Observations and measurements were made, showing The position of each tree: This will be diagrammatically portraged by Dr. anderson. The trees, (Red Eum & apple), were carred in the bark, with a short bladed comahawk sixty years ago, and The bank being absent it was necessary to reconstruct The different patterns of the carrings in chalk, from well-defined scaro made on The sap-wood. home of The trees are worthy of removal. associated with the trees and interculated more or less regularly with The former, are a number of mounds of heaped earth. These will be also shown on The plan. There is also, in The north-east corner of the Bora fround, a cresentie mound 2 feet high by 15 feet greatest length. Two of The smaller variety and The exercentic mound were cut through and bottomed on sendstone at a depth of about four feet. They entained nothing of an aboveginal character. The site is in open forest country on a slight eminence or plateau. Four of the trees were photographed; Those carves all around were taken from different views. The growns was exceptionally level & sandy. On Thursday, Dr anderson or Chatton proceeded in another direction to photograph some rock paintings, which I believe are exceptionally fine. I spent The day collecting Alakes + other Implements at the camp site in the Bora ground vicinity. In conclusion I would like to place on record The hospitality afforted us by min Eather and here family, a fact which we Lwill always remember with pleasure and mention Jours Respectfully with fratitude.

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
