As a resident of mollymook beach, I wish to table my objection to the amendment to the above development i.e. 6 extra housing blocks at the southern end of the development in Narrawallee.

My objection is on environmental and amenity grounds. The proposed extra 6 blocks will destroy a lovely stand of tall trees, which provide shade for the council reserve strip along Seapray st. The trees are well used by native birds and wildlife including the glossy black cockatoo, powerful owls and possums, who are finding their habitat continually threatened by the mass land-clearing currently seen as the norm in new developments in the area. The question must be asked. When is enough, enough? When will we get our heads out of the sand and realise that continually destroying the urban canopy is destroying our health and well being. The land already cleared for this development and the future land clearing to be undertaken has already scarred the landscape and threatened the wildlife. We need to protect as many old growth trees as possible. The benefits of these in an urban environment is well documented and we should be heeding the science.
