There are substitutes presently available to replace our current use of hardwoods

Plantations already provide 91% of Australia's log production

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## **Topic 5. The role of State Forests in maximising the delivery of a range of environmental, economic and social outcomes and options for diverse management, including Aboriginal forest management models**

The Forestry Corporation operates at a loss which runs into tens of millions of dollars whereas First Nations Ranger programs have been hugely successful

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## **Topic 6. Opportunities to realise carbon and biodiversity benefits and support carbon and biodiversity markets, and mitigate and adapt to climate change risks, including the greenhouse gas emission impacts of different uses of forests and assessment of climate change risks to forests**
