Topic 1. Sustainability of current and future forestry operations in NSW

I am particularly concerned about the logging of any native forests. I have travelled widely in NSW visiting National Parks as well as other areas. Areas like the Dorrigo rainforest are so special and rich and diverse in native flora and fauna. Dorrigo is protected, but all areas of native forest should have protection from logging. More and more evidence is known of the important biodiversity present, which has grown over thousands of years and which will be destroyed by logging. We know now how trees support each other underground and are learning of the importance of fungal networks. Once destroyed they will never recover their diversity completely. We will lose species before we even know they exist.

I cannot believe that beautiful old native trees are still being cut down, turned into wood chips and exported. And this industry is being subsidised by our taxes. The statistics I have seen make a plain case for stopping immediately: I will not try to add to all the words already written.
