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Topic 1. Sustainability of current and future forestry operations in NSW

I believe that the forestey practice of the 1990's of buying unviable farms and converting to forest plantations, in which I was involved as a subcontracting tree planter, was and still would be an efficient means to improve availability of timber products for the building and construction industry, but certainly not to supply wood chips for export or for burning for electricity generation.
