Topic 1. Sustainability of current and future forestry operations in NSW

I've been in milling for 10 years. We use the resource we receive responsibly. The logs are tagged so we know they've been logged in line with the state regulations to maintain the forests sustainability. The use of the forest now and into the future is viable, and I support it.

We manage our forests well in NSW. the State and Private forests are harvested under rules that ensure they regrow and can be used again and again without losing the plants and animals from the forest.
