#### Topic 1. Sustainability of current and future forestry operations in NSW

I have been a resident on the South Coast for over 40 years. During this time I have witnessed the destruction of our Native forests. I have seen the country response, it has become drier and more fire prone. The mess left behind after logging, often makes travelling through country near impossible. I am a horse rider and have seen this issue first hand. How do you control fires in this situation? The only way is to wait for them to emerge from a coup and fight from a trail/road. Not a good scenario, with the fire feeding on the discarded trees.

#### Topic 2. Environmental and cultural values of forests, including threatened species and Aboriginal cultural heritage values

Monocultures have taken over and native species can no longer exist in many of these logged forest. As a First Nation person, I have been heartbroken by the way Forestry knowingly has destroyed Indigenous artefacts and bulldozed sacred sites. I believe the motto was bury it, burn it or simply remove it! Having also worked in Flora and Fauna surveys for Forestry, I know first hand that, if a discovery was inconvenient that it simply was not documented.

### Topic 3. Demand for timber products, particularly as relates to NSW housing, construction, mining, transport and retail

I believe that the situation we are finding ourselves in, is due largely to decades of good hardwood timber being chipped to satisfy overseas interests. Our Forests have been mismanaged for too long.

#### Topic 4. The future of softwood and hardwood plantations and the continuation of Private Native Forestry in helping meet timber supply needs

We need to be smarter. Stop exporting our timber, increase softwood plantations on private lands. Build smaller houses, decrease our footprint size.

# Topic 5. The role of State Forests in maximising the delivery of a range of environmental, economic and social outcomes and options for diverse management, including Aboriginal forest management models

State Forests Corp. is owned by the people for the people. Our forests are not a infinite resource to be squandered by poor management practises.
