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Dear Independent Forestry Panel Secretariat

Please accept my submission into the sustainability of current and future forestry operations in NSW.

- I own 200ac of native regenerated forest, with 2 boundaries adjoining the
 As you would know this is a reserve from Tanja State Forrest. In fact 100ac of this property used to be part of the state forest.
- The cessation of logging on my property and the reserve demonstrates how much the wildlife benefit, especially with large amounts of contiguous forest.
- Koala scats were found in a scientific survey at the edge of our property and if this was logged it would obviously destroy this habitat. This applies to habitat all throughout NSW state forest.
- In conjunction with the South East NSW Regional Forestry Hub, I completed the Australian Master TreeGrower Program, which in part, shows agroforestery can be a significant and sustainable way to provide timber into to the future, without the damage to habitat etc. in the existing state forests.
- I fully support an end to native forest logging and a future based on sustainable grown tees, ideally agroforestry but also well managed diverse plantations.
- Logging of native forests is leading to the extinction of species, such as the Greater Glider and Koala and so cannot be described as sustainable.
- Their seems also to be evidence that logging increases risks of severe fires. Please see the following:
