Topic 1. Sustainability of current and future forestry operations in NSW

This idea of logging forests because it makes for jobs and materials for building is a short term one as forests are finite. Topic 2. Environmental and cultural values of forests, including threatened species and Aboriginal cultural heritage values

The destruction of our limited forests is unsustainable and deeply unethical and a criminally bad choice for governments to allow ongoing decimation of them. Plastics are now into a trajectory of extremely problematic quantities of refuse, so should be processed at scale into useable building components. The potential is limitless and all efforts must be made to do this and make the plastics option a cheap and popular alternative to wood.

Topic 4. The future of softwood and hardwood plantations and the continuation of Private Native Forestry in helping meet timber supply needs

The clearing of land by land owners for selling off to enrich themselves - is like putting a child in a lollyshop and hoping he/she won't gorge themselves.
