I object to the Plasrefine plant because:

This area was intended for companies in medical research and biotechnology, building on the foundation laid by the Garvan Institute's Australian Bio-Resources (ABR) facility. A large-scale industrial operation like the Plasrefine plant could seriously undermine these goals.

- The noise, traffic, and environmental impacts of a massive recycling plant could create an inhospitable environment for sensitive biotech research. Companies may think twice before setting up near such a facility, jeopardising the development of the SHIP's Bio-Tech sub-precinct.
- A four-storey industrial plant sprawling across 3.24 hectares would dominate the landscape, clashing with the SHIP's vision of low-impact, integrated development.
- This could affect the region's appeal, not only as a place to work and innovate but also as a beautiful place to live and visit.
- Even the project's own environmental impact statement points to potential negative social effects changes to the area's character, increased traffic from heavy vehicles, and additional stress on the community.
